

Sociology is launching a new journal section and invites submissions that debate contemporary issues with a uniquely sociological perspective.

This section provides a space for a lively and critical engagement with contemporary issues. It aims to publish short (maximum 2,000 words) articles that aim to provoke debate and present a sociological perspective on contemporary events, policies, reports, issues, mobilisations, practices and theories. The articles can also engage with debates or articles published in the journal or can contribute to recent discussions and developments in the field that deserve attention or require thoughtful deliberation. Interventions will be direct and informative, and preferably focused on ideas and debates concerned with the creation of a more just society.

We welcome submissions on any suitable topic and are particularly interested in interventions that address Covid-19, climate crisis, police violence, decolonising universities and Black Lives Matter.

Our aim is for a prompt turnaround time so as to provide a platform for sharing ideas and stimulating conversations. Therefore, we also welcome publication of multiple Interventions that are in conversation with each other in constructive ways.

Interventions will receive light touch editorial and peer review comment with a focus on prompt publication in recognition of the nature of these pieces and to facilitate sharing and debate.
