
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
## Sociological Voices in Public Discourse

As is usual practice at some larger conferences, roundtable sessions are where a number of presentations are given simultaneously at separate tables within a single room. Each table will have a session chair and the papers allocated to it will be grouped by topic areas. Each of the four papers within the roundtable will be allocated a 20 minute slot (15 minutes presentation followed by 5 minutes questions).

PowerPoint will not be available for use during the roundtable sessions, we'd like all presenters to see this as an opportunity to break away from the traditional PowerPoint presentation and think more creatively about their input at the conference.
